Results of University and other Examinations

 School was inspected in Oct for Secondary Registration and passed by Inspector - Director of Educ refused owing to small numbers in post-junior classes.

GENERAL REMARKS

Religion is only moderately well taught in the primary classes. The meanings of words in the Catechism usually brought about a reduction in other percentages in the subject. The very large numbers in 5 and 6 under one teacher must be taken into account. The weight he has to carry is evident from the numbers. His load should be reduced as soon as the opportunity occurs. Though the classes are so large discipline is quite good. Some scheme for improving the home work in these classes needs organizing. As parents regard the written home work of the pupil as the 'show window' indicating whether the pupil and teacher are interested in securing good work, the reputation of this section of the school is definitely involved. Effort by the boys is all that is required as in the test in Writing the quality was decidedly better than the average home exercise.

The teaching of the secondary subjects tends to be prolonged in the afternoons. The tone of the school is good and the demeanour of the boys most pleasing. C. Politeness was fair to satisfactory.
