GENERAL REMARKS

The primary school is a small unit of three classes, each heavily populated. Grade VII impresses very much with the diversity of activity, the imaginative handling of text material, the accommodation for individual differences, and the high standard of accomplishment in basic subjects. An extension of such methods and organization would make the primary division highly efficient. The senior school is taught by a strong competent staff. A reasonable choice of subjects, strongly academic, is offered - giving students an excellent preparation for entry to tertiary institutes. The choice of Italian is a logical one, but there is need for a competent teacher of the subject to be worthwhile.

With the growth of the school, the administrative area is proving inadequate and ill-positioned. Its resiting, the replacement of existing toilets, the provision of a new library hinge upon the policy for the school's future. The limitations of a single stream lower secondary may be less serious than problems arising from their transfer to Bedford.

The school itself operates very efficiently, and all are to be congratulated upon the fine spirit of cooperation and industry within the school.
