than their own specific assignment.

The classrooms and science facilities for the senior students are of high standard. By contrast, the three classrooms for the lower secondary school are very basic - 4 walls, blackboard and desks. The Primary classrooms are little better, but are at least adorned by a greater variety of equipment and instructional materials. The two temporary remedial rooms are comfortably furnished and well-equipped with resource materials.

Plans are presently being developed to upgrade facilities and resources at Highgate:

GENERAL REMARKS

1. a new Library (\$26,400 Commonwealth Grant);
2. an upgrading and re-structuring of Primary School;
3. Toilets, Change Rooms, Storage;
4. Re-location of Staff Room and Administration Centre;
5. General Science/Biology laboratory;
6. An Assembly Room: Hall/Auditorium;
7. Facilities for Achievement Certificate classes.

SECONDARY SUBJECTS TAUGHT

The students, largely from working class, migrant families make a very favourable impression. Relationships between the members of the school community - teachers, students, parents - are marked by a spirit of co-operation, generosity, enthusiasm and mutual support. All are to be commended for their efforts in striving and succeeding in large measure in producing a social climate, which characterises this school as a Christian one.
